Quality Child Care Niagara Support Visits

- One hundred and ten (110) support visits either in person or virtually were completed from January to mid-March and October to December 2020 by the QCCN Team.
- Two hundred and seventy-six (276) staff were consulted during the support visits
- Beginning October 2020, QCCN Support Visits were transformed to be offered virtually allowing program educators and children to maintain safety while still connecting with the QCCN team and keeping the tools an important priority. The purpose of the visits was to reconnect to have conversations on how their Team was implementing the tools, despite the barriers presented by COVID-19 and learn how they could be further supported with these unique challenges.

From April to July, **13 QCCN Community Conversation Cafés** were offered while QCCN Support Visits were on hold due to the pandemic.









These [tools] are important because early intervention is key to helping a child who may be experiencing developmental delays. By regularly using these tools, we increase the likelihood of detecting these delays and helping get the children the help that they need. Also, in the cases where the children aren't experiencing delays, they help us to see where the child is at and learn what is best to help them learn











Quality Child Care Niagara Tools and Resources

- QCCN Annual Support Visit Form was modified to highlight specific areas of support that needed focus during this time and to be shorter in length to meet the time constraints centres could possibly face with the many new policies and procedures in place.
- Centre Image Release Form was updated to include a section with tips, strategies, and a visual on how to take a photo of children "not clearly identified."
- QCCN Support Visit Process Chart was developed to ensure centre Supervisors had a clear understanding of the new way of conducting the visits all the while considering the same supportive approach Quality Child Care Niagara has always followed.
- Strategies to Develop Family Engagement for Educators document was designed to support educators with their ongoing collaborative partnership with families through family engagement reflections and strategies on how to design a family engagement survey.
- Introduction to Quality Child Care Niagara handout was developed for educators and families to highlight the developmental screening tools, overview of Quality Child Care Niagara, and its Vision, Statement and Values.
- DPS & Speech and Language Tracking Sheet was created with the feedback and request from educators within our community which reflects the importance of the developmental screening tools. This document allows the tracking of both DPS and Speech and Language on one convenient sheet.
- Strategies and Resources for Implementing QCCN Tools and Tasks handout is being developed through connecting with educators and community partners in Niagara to support the ongoing implementation of Quality Child Care Niagara tools and resources during these unparalleled times by including strategies and resources.

The Family Engagement Survey is an excellent way for families to feel a sense of belonging in the program. This is a stated goal in How Does Learning Happen and therefore is in direct alignment with Ontario's pedagogy for the early years. Given the Covid-19 restrictions, this becomes particularly important as many parents have been excluded from entering child care centres. It is also a great opportunity for centres to find out what matters to families and how programs can be adjusted to accommodate their needs.

Niagara College - Quality Child Care Niagara Reflective Practice Institute Webinar Modules Training

- **105 Niagara College students** participated in the QCCN Reflective Practice Institute Pre-Recorded Webinar Modules
- 93% of students felt confident in applying the skills they learned to their current and future practice.
- 93% of students gained new knowledge and 96% had a greater understanding of the QCCN tools and resources.
- 98% of students found the tools and resources from the QCCN Institute to be impactful to their current and future practice.
- QCCN Community Conversation Café: Next Steps for Further Support Following the QCCN Webinar Modules for Niagara College Students was delivered in December following the completion of the five pre-recorded webinar modules.

Child Care Centres - Quality Child Care Niagara Reflective Practice Institute Webinar Modules Training

The two-day in-person QCCN Reflective Practice Institute was transformed into five (5) webinar modules offered through Zoom. The live webinar module training was available for educators supporting infant, toddler and preschool programs who did not previously participate in the two-day QCCN Reflective Practice Institutes and the pre-recorded webinar module training was available for the Niagara College students.

- 69 educators representing 37 centres attended the live QCCN Reflective Practice Institute Webinar Modules
- 96% of educators found the tools and resources from the training to be impactful to their current practice
- 92% of educators felt confident in applying what they had learned from the training to their current practice

Quality Child Care Niagara Webpage and Statistics for 2020

- QCCN website had 1,581 visits this year with the highest in the month of October
- 500% increase in visits for the Frequently Asked Questions page from last year
- Three new webpages were added to the QCCN website; QCCN Sessions Online, QCCN Support Visits, and Niagara College Students
- QCCN Sessions Online webpage was created in June with a total of **245 visits** where it highlights all the QCCN Community Conversation Cafés and QCCN Webinar sessions that were offered this year


